RINAWA - Validation workshop on R&I guidelines Workshop Report

CONTEXT

The RINaWa project is about 'Strengthening Research and Innovation (R&I) in Natural Resources Management (NRM) and Waste Management (WM). It is being implemented in four target countries: Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania and Zambia-

"It is in response to the Southern African Development Community's (SADC's) Regional Development Agenda and the 2020-2030 SADC Regional Indicative Strategic Development Plan (RISDP). The project, thus, seeks to address challenges confronting SADC as it strives to support the region in attaining sustainable natural resource management and waste management through the respective frameworks. The Research and Innovation outputs aim to facilitate effective implementation of the RISDP actions on NRM and WM. It is therefore relevant to both the government needs and the citizens of the SADC region at large, including the local communities who are the primary beneficiaries. The project targets the research and tertiary education Institutions, government entities, local and national groupings, value chain actors and the public-private sector linkage.

The main objective of the project is to strengthen sustainable WM and NRM in the targeted countries of the Southern African region. Its specific Strategic Objectives (SOs) (outcomes) are as follows:

- SO1: Research and tertiary education institutes applying up-to-date research and training in waste management WM and NRM.
- SO2: Government entities drafting, implementing, and monitoring WM and NRM policies based on scientifically developed evidence.
- SO3: Strengthened and effective participation of local and national groupings from society (IPLCs, CBOs, CSOs) in evidence-based decision-making in WM and NRM.
- SO4: Effective WM and NRM practices applied by value chain actors from the formal and informal sectors and
- SO5: Improved collaboration between experts from the public and private sectors on WM and NRM R&I issues (science-policy-practice interface).

To realize these NRM-WM specific objectives, the project adopts a wider (ecosystem-based) approach that seeks to innovatively strengthen capacity through Science, Action, Policy and Engagement. The specific activities of the project are as follows:

- i. **Capacity strengthening of research and tertiary education institutes** in delivering research and training in WM and NRM.
- ii. **Capacity strengthening of government entities** in drafting, implementing, and monitoring WM and NRM policies.



- iii. **Capacity enhancement of local and national groupings from society** in effective participation and decision making in sustainable WM and NRM based on scientifically driven evidence.
- iv. Demonstration of innovative operational and management solutions to value chain actors in the WM+NRM sectors.
- v. **Effective collaboration of Actors** from the science-policy-practice on WM and NRM issues.

The project is coordinated by the SADC Secretariat, implemented jointly by The College of African Wildlife Management (CAWM)-Mweka, Tanzania and The World-Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) – Mozambique and supported on the ground by four local multipliers operating within the target countries. These are Sky berry Botswana Proprietary Limited (Botswana), Southern African Wildlife College (SAWC) (South Africa), Community Wildlife Management Areas Consortium (CWMAC) (Tanzania) and Repensar (Mozambique).

The Southern African Wildlife College is the responsible for deliverable 1.5: Conduct training on building capacity in financial, technical and managerial aspects of R&I and develop guidelines, which is part of Work Package 1. In 2024 the SAWC compiled the guidelines, a sub-activity of 1.5. This report is for the Guideline Validation Workshop held in February 2025.

PROCEEDINGS

Welcome and Purpose J. Newenham	 Everyone was welcomed and thanked for their attendance. Jenny provided some context to getting to this point in the process: SAWC was allocated two main deliverables: Developing the Research and Innovation Guidelines for research and tertiary institutions and hosting the Science Cafes in Maputo and Lilongwe. Four short-term consultants were appointed to assist the SAWC in developing the Guidelines. The Guidelines were drafted and shared with RINaWa partners for inputs. Most participants at the Validation Workshop had been involved in previous RINaWa activities. Jenny highlighted the purpose of the day: To validate the drafted guidelines and provide any edits. It is not intended to re-write the whole document.
Presentation	The SAWC short-term consulting staff provided context and led the participants through the Draft Guidelines.
Prof Mkonda (as a SAWC appointed staff to assist with RINaWa deliverables)	Msafiri provided an overview of the process used to develop the Guidelines. This was captured in Part 1 of the Document, which provides context and the approach to the process. Msafiri then provided a summary of the Managerial Guidelines developed so far. These are a component of Part 2 – the actual guidelines.
Presentation Dr Bonyongo (as a SAWC appointed staff to assist with RINaWa deliverables)	Casper provided the summary of the Technical and Financial Guidelines. These are also in Part 2 of the Guideline Documents.



Assessing the current Guidelines Lead by Dr Bonyongo

With the small group it was decided that it was not necessary to have breakaway groups.

The afternoon session the participants assed the guidelines which were compiled.

Casper led the process and provided a presentation to guide the process in assessing each of the guidelines.

All the guidelines had been captured in an excel spreadsheet for ease in assessing them against the criteria.

The following assessment criteria were used. Each guideline (under the topics: technical, managerial and financial) was rated on a scale of 0-3 (where 0 = low and 3 = high):

- Relevance.
- Avoidance of duplication,
- Feasibility,
- Ethical acceptability,
- Political acceptability,
- Applicability, and
- Urgency

The discussions amongst the in-person participants were robust and very interactive. Their input was valuable and will help to fine tune the guidelines.

This session took quite a bit longer than planned.

Highlight **good practices** – e.g. practices that are working, innovative, partnerships, learning opportunities, willingness to engage, willingness to change.

- Overall, the group felt that the Draft Guidelines were good and appreciated the effort that had gone into them. They felt only some fine tuning was required.
- Good to have all four target countries of RINaWa Programme represented (Malawi. Mozambique, Tanzania and Zambia) as well as South Africa.
- All but one of the participants had participated in other RINaWa discussions / workshops, and so little context / background to the project was required. As a result most of the group knew each other quite well, which contributed to the ease of the discussions.

Highlight challenges/ problems

- Unfortunately, it wasn't as engaging with online participants as was hoped and desired. Only a few comments were forthcoming. The sound may have been partly a challenge (even though a speaker was brought in, but also the quick discussions held by the in-person participants made it challenging for online participants to be more involved (even though the online screen was managed and followed. Nevertheless, the online participants' presence was appreciated.
- There were some comments and queries regarding the title: "Mentoring". However, in the latest log frame and Workplan this had been edited so the new title was updated.
- How can the document be a practical tool for universities? So that it doesn't sit on a shelf. I.e. ensure uptake of the document.
- Address typos etc.



Reflect on things learnt from the meeting.	 How to link the Guidelines with being more practical (especially for the tertiary institutions, which have a less academic approach and are more applied). There was a need to approach the Guideline development from a more general perspective so that they are more inclusive, because if there was more focus on certain aspects they would become too 'exclusive'. How to incorporate Indigenous Knowledge Systems. Other key points to keep in mind: Data protection policy Ethics Use of artificial intelligence (AI). [Most of these matters should be incorporated into the Institution's own Strategy document] as it is very difficult to be too prescriptive.

WAY FORWARD

It was agreed that the next steps were:

- 1. Prof. Mkonda and Dr. Bonyongo will finalise the version 2 of the Final Draft of the Guidelines, taking on board the comments and edits arising from the workshop.
- 2. J. Newenham will share Final Draft version 2 of the Guidelines with all participants (in-person and online) for their final edits / comments. The PDF of the presentations will also be shared with all participants.
- 3. The SAWC team will prepare the final Guideline documents.
- 4. The final Guidelines Documents will then be shared with SADC partners and implementing partners of the RINaWa Programme.
- 5. J. Newenham will in the meantime prepare the Validation Workshop Report

CONCLUSION

It was a very valuable session, with a great diversity of academics, most of whom have been involved in the RINaWa Programme from its initial activities. There were two representatives from each of the target countries.

The small group allowed for good discussions, but if time allowed it would have been good to have additional in-person participants contributing to the conversation.

Although the Guidelines focus on tertiary institutions and academics, it must be remembered that capacity is also needed in the more practical aspects, especially revolving around waste management. Also, much of the innovation (in waste management) happens on the ground and not in tertiary institutions.


